Library open by **Appointment** Lyme Free Library is now open by appointment for book browsing. Contactless front porch pickup will remain available for patrons who prefer grab and go services. The visits will be limited to 2 people at a time. Arrangements can be made for families with multiple children. Parents must remain with their children at all times. Patrons are limited to one 30-minute visit per day. Face coverings must be worn by all patrons over the age of two, covering the nose and mouth. Social distancing of 6 feet needs to be maintained. Anyone who is unable to wear a mask due to a medical condition is urged to use front porch pickup. Patrons not wearing masks will not be allowed in the library. We will provide a mask if you do not have one. Gloves need to be worn we will supply them (non-latex). Lyme Garden Club

"I like gardening-it's a place where I find myself when I need to lose myself." - **Alice Sebold**

If you are like most gardeners, deadheading may feel like a tedious, never-ending garden chore but it is an important task to maintain a plant's appearance and to improve its overall performance. New blooms produced from this task can make the extra effort well worth it. It is important to keep up with deadheading throughout the growing season. As flowers shed their pedals and begin to form seed heads, energy is focused on the development of the seeds, rather than the flowers. Regular deadheading channels the energy into the flowers. The result is healthier plants and continual blooms.

There are different techniques for deadheading and maintaining flowering plants. Garden pruners will make a nice clean cut, but in some cases, your fingers can do a better job by pinching. Some plants that can be pinched include daylilies, salvia and coleus. Coleus are grown for their foliage, not their flowers. Pinch or cut off the flower stem below the dead flower and just above the first set of full healthy leaves. Pinching off the flowers encourages plants to become fuller. When each flower is on its own stem, such as Scabiosa plants, it is best to deadhead the entire flowering stem instead of leaving a gangly, headless stem attached to a plant. Cut the stem at the base of the plant. Sometimes it may be easier to deadhead plants by shearing them back entirely. Shear away the top few inches of the plant, enough to remove the dead blossoms. Coreopsis and perennial Geraniums are good candidates for shearing. Always check plants carefully to make sure no flower buds are hiding under the faded blooms before you shear the top of the plant.

The main point of deadheading plants is to make your flower beds look amazing, so don't drop your blooms to the ground. Collect dead blooms as you deadhead and toss into your compost pile. Nothing is more rewarding than watching your garden come to life with beautiful blooms. Practice the task of deadheading throughout the season and nature will bless you with a second wave of blooms to enjoy! (gardeningknowhow.com, thespruce.com)



The Summer Sailing Series - Part 1: Introduction

Junior Division's Long History of Teaching Sailing on Chaumont Bay

The "Junior Division" program of teaching children water safety, and sailing began in the heart of the depression in 1931 at Crescent Yacht Club. It was the brainchild of Mr. Joseph Ellis who was then the commodore of CYC on Sawmill Bay (an organization that began in 1901). The education program has continued every summer since then with the exceptions of the war years (1942-45) and during Covid (2020).

During the early Depression years, parents saved gas money by borrowing a school bus from the Brownville school and running it each day between Watertown, Brownville, Dexter, Limerick, and Chaumont, picking up children along the way. A few commuted by train on the New York Central from Watertown to Chaumont. The first class of 1931 included Chris Johnston's mother, Betty Ann Hart. Other earlier Lyme notables have passed through the program, such as all the George brothers (of George Brothers hardware store).

In the post-war years attendance swelled as the baby boomers came of age – up to 90 children participated in the mid-1950s. Notable instructors from that time included at least one America's Cup sailor (Toby Cosgrove) and two all-American collegiate swimmers (Dutch Suddeth and Cathy Wardwell).

The program split from the Yacht Club to become CYC Junior Division, Inc., a Non-Profit, in 1986. To this day the mission of the program remains the same, "To instill a lifelong love of sailing in safe, fun and educational way".

The program remains fortunate to be able to attract and retain exceptional staff many of whom attended the program themselves. All staff are certified US Sailing Instructors and/or certified Red Cross Lifeguards.

In 2019 with the help of over 110 generous local community donors, working with Charlie Valentine, Junior division put up a new building which has a



classroom, office, restrooms, and lockers. Northern New York Community Foundation (NNYCF) has recently established a new CYC Junior Division Sustaining Fund for contributions to the annual operating budget of the Junior division. The NNYCF has an excellent 88-year record of skilled support for many Northern New York charitable organizations through careful and professional management of funds.

This year we begin a new chapter of growth with the opening of a new facility, shoreline improvements, launch, and docks! The program has expanded to include youth ages 4-adult. The program strives to become a true Community Sailing Center for Northern New York.

The Heritage Center cancelled the programs that were scheduled for summer 2020 and we are rescheduling those same programs for summer 2021.

June 13 - Dr. Laurie Rush - While looking at eastern North America, the presentation will also discuss the indigenous people who traveled through our region and lived along the eastern shore of Lake Ontario and its tributaries thousands of years ago, including those

called "Point Peninsula People" by archaeologists.

June 27 - The Aubertine/Farmer/ Countryman band will play familiar songs from the 60s, & 70s and some old time Gospel. Those who wish are invited to sing along.

July 18 - Maureen Barros and Bob Uhlig on Stone houses. Maureen and Bob have written a book on the stone houses of Jefferson County, but in this presentation they will focus on the stone houses of the Town of Lyme.

August 15 - Clarence Giles on Penet Square. Penet Square is a neglected portion of our local history. Judge Giles is a highly regarded member of his community and has stories and maps of the Square.

September 12 - Dennis and Kathi McCarthy, well-known Thousand Islands scuba divers, will present "Shipwrecks don't come with names: the identification of the 2011 shipwreck discovered off Cape Vincent.

October 3 - Ken Knapp is a local curator who for more than a decade has been cataloguing a series of interconnected indigenous sites throughout the northwest corner of Jefferson County, and has found lroquois artifacts that date back thousands of years.
