#### Roy Fairman's History of the Chaumont Bridge


Next April the Department of Transportation will begin to deconstruct the bridge which has spanned the Chaumont River for over 60 years. We thought readers would enjoy this 1957 article which Roy Fairman wrote to mark the deconstruction of the previous bridge (often called "The Long Bridge"), built in 1824. The following is a re-print of Fairman's "As Time Goes By" column which appeared in the Syracuse Herald-American on Sunday, February 10, 1957.

Central New Yorkers who visit the resort village of Chaumont or pass through it on their way to or from the excellent fishing



grounds in the St. Lawrence River off Cape Vincent will be interested in learning that a new bridge in the not too distant future will replace the present long viaduct which spans the mouth of the Chaumont River as it flows into Chaumont Bay, an arm of Lake Ontario.

Construction of the new bridge is on the State program for 1957. It will be built a short distance south of the present one, which will be used until the new one is completed.



W h engineers began to study the bridge situation, they first intended to place the new viaduct north of the historic

old causeway, which would have necessitated the removal of the little white house once owned and occupied by Stephen Horton, my maternal great grandfather, when he was toll collector at the east end of the causeway.

#### **Congdon House**

The house is now owned by Mrs. Charles G. Congdon, whose late husband was publisher of the Watertown Daily Times. Mrs. Congdon is the former Miss Martha Caldwell, native of Syracuse and a member of a family long engaged in the lumber business in this city.

As study of the bridge problem progressed, the engineers decided that it would be more advisable to place the new viaduct on the south instead



of north of the old one. This saved the old toll house but made necessary the removal of an equally old landmark across the street.

This building, like its neighbor, was built in the early years of the 19th Century when the business section of the village was along Lower Chaumont Bay which the bridge spans. For many years after erection the front part of this building was a store with living quarters in the rear.

When the railroad reached Chaumont in 1852 the depot was built in what Lower Bay residents call "uptown." Naturally, Village business houses moved into that area, and the stores along the waterfront were left vacant. Today, of all the

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buildings there once used for business purposes, only two remain.

It has been more than 100 years since a store was housed in the front part of that building. When I was a boy the late William Knapp, who, with his family lived in the rear apartment, used it as a paint shop. In the subsequent years many persons have lived in the apartment. It now houses the Darlington family.


The old "long bridge" dates back to 1824. Previous to that, the river was crossed by ferry. The first bridge was erected by James Leray de Chaumont, a French royalist who owned a great tract of land in that part of Jefferson County, after he was authorized to do so by the State Legislature. It was a toll bridge and the little house now owned by Mrs. Congdon was built for the toll collector.

By 1850, when Leray and his associates were no longer there, the bridge had fallen into such a state of disrepair as to be almost impassable. It was taken over and repaired by the Town of Lyme with help from the Jefferson County Board of Supervisors. Cost of the repair job was \$11,000. Little has been done in the way of improvement since that time.

#### **Built of Limestone**

The viaduct is a causeway built of limestone blocks, on the top of which is a roadway. It has three "draws" to allow the tide to ebb and flow. In one of these draws is a lift bridge which for many years was opened occasionally to allow the passage of schooners and steamers to a stone quarry a short distance up the river.

Several lift bridges on the causeway have worn out



and have been replaced. The present one was built in 1911. The new viaduct will have no drawbridge as large vessels no longer cruise up Chaumont River. It will be erected high enough above the water to allow passage of small craft.

In horse and buggy days the bridge was considered of ample width, but, with the ever-increasing number of automobiles crossing, it has been regarded as too narrow for many years.

Furthermore, the road is so close to the water that during strong gales waves sweep over the roadway and drench passing cars and pedestrians.

Many schooners, tugs and steamships once bore the name "Chaumont" on their sterns. But that era is past and about the only craft you see on the waters of Chaumont Bay today are pleasure boats owned by members of the Crescent Yacht Club, which has its headquarters in Chaumont.

The village, which once hummed with industrial activity in its stone quarries, seed houses, limekilns and shipyards, is now a summer resort and residential suburb of nearby Watertown. But the fishing and the scenic beauty are as great as ever and many Syracusans spend vacations in cottages on Independence Point or on Point Salubrious, on the opposite side of Chaumont Bay. Many others will use the new bridge when it is completed as they motor to or from one of their favorite fishing grounds at Cape Vincent.

On *August 15<sup>th</sup>* Clarence Giles will talk about Penet's Square, a fascinating part of local history that few are familiar with.

The Lyme Heritage Center is open for the summer with regular hours! Volunteers are available on *Mondays*, *Wednesdays*, and *Fridays* from 1-3PM, *Tuesdays* from 10AM-12PM, and *Friday* evenings from 6-8PM.

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#### Lyme Garden Club

"Garden as though you will live forever." - **William Kent** 

Gardening is a rewarding activity that provides a host of benefits beyond access to fresh fruits, vegetables and beautiful blooms. Gardening is great physical therapy for maintaining joint flexibility, bone density and range of motion but the work can also be painful. Gardeners have many tools available to them. Among those options are ergonomic tools. Ergonomics is the science of refining product design to optimize it for human use. Ergonomic gardening tools are designed to ensure that using them has as little effect on the body as possible. These tools align with how a person naturally moves his or her body, which reduces the likelihood that gardeners will suffer any strains or sprains. Ergonomic tools have longer handles, are made of lightweight materials, and offer smaller grips. They also tend to:

- ♦ Neutralize joint position
- ♦ Minimize stress
- ♦ Allow for different sizes
- ♦ Add soft padding
- ♦ Reduce vibration include thumb rest and proper diameter grips
- ♦ Feature spring-loaded power assistive features

Three aspects to keep in mind when selecting ergonomic garden tools are:

- → Adjustable-choose tools that allow you to adopt a variety of postures as you work.
- ♦ Lightweight-use the lightest tool possible. If force is required, use your largest muscle groups.
- ♦ Multiple sizes or heights-conduct work with your joints at about the midpoint of your range of movement, especially your head, trunk and upper limbs.


Green Heron Tools, launched by two women farmers, invented the term "hergonomic". The HERShovel, features a D-shape handle, a shorter shaft, and an angled blade with a generous area for foot placement.

Motus makes garden tool grips modeled after the grips farmers use on scythes to cut grain. To determine the right fit, make a circle with your index finger and thumb; that's the correct size of grip for your tools.

Ergonomic tools increase gardeners' capabilities. The principles behind ergonomics keep gardeners using the tools in natural positions. Gardeners won't lose power to bending and twisting, enabling them to do more in the garden. These user-friendly tools for avid gardeners who have arthritis, back pain and other

physical limitations can make gardening enjoyable again. (www.agriculture.com/machinery/tools/handtools, Keys Home, Spring 2021 The Citizen.
