Village of Chaumont News

Village Clerk/Treasurer

The Village Board is accepting applications for the Village Clerk/Treasurer position. Interested applicants must submit an application and resume to the Village Office by August 1, 2021 to be considered.

Village Beach

The Village Board of Trustees is happy to announce that the Village Beach will be reopening on July 2nd. Lifeguards will be on duty for the months of July and August. The village provides picnic tables, grills, portable bathrooms and playground equipment. There will be (2) trash receptacles placed at the shed, one for cans & bottles and trash will be picked up weekly. We do ask that if you bring it in, please take it out with you. The village has implemented beach fees to help offset the cost of maintaining the beach, the sanitary facilities and lifeguard staff. Village residents may obtain a seasonal beach pass free of charge. Please contact Karen at the village office to obtain a pass.

Beach fees for non-residents are \$1.00 per person, \$5.00 for groups over 5, children accompanied by a parent are free. Scheduled events are \$25.00 and up depending on the type of event. Call the village office 315-649-2900 to schedule your event and request special accommodations.

Lifeguards positions are still available. Minimum qualifications include certifications in First Aid and CPR. Lifeguards must be beach certified. Work hours would range between 20 & 35 hours per week with an hourly rate of \$14.50. Please apply via email to stephanie2125@aol.com or contact The Village Office at 315-649-2900.

Talk of the Town (of Lyme)

In our previous Lyme Light article, the following projects in the Town of Lyme were highlighted. I am pleased to provide this update:

- Water Facility: The new water facility is now complete and open for business! Thank you to Ed Barton and Son, Builders, the Town of Lyme Water Board, the Village of Chaumont and the Lyme Highway Department for making it happen!
- Lyme Veterans Memorial Park: Progress continues with bi-weekly virtual meetings held to address such matters as permitting, budgeting, record-keeping, program compliance, etc. Parties to these meetings include representatives of the NYS Departments of State and Environmental Conservation, the NYS Dormitory Authority, the Lake Ontario REDI Project Manager (Executive Chamber REDI Project Team), Army Corps of Engineers and the Town of Lyme and BCA Architects & Engineers.
- Town Office / Town Meetings: The Town Office is now fully open for regular business, Monday through Thursday, between the hours of 9 AM - 4 PM. Regular meetings of all town boards will now be open to the public. Individuals who are not vaccinated will be asked to continue to wear masks.

As we've all experienced during this last unusual year, life is often too complicated to focus on much more than the basic tasks of everyday life. For many of us, keeping up with current issues facing local government - its day-to-day operations, challenges faced, or the many functions performed - is not high on the to-do list, if it makes the list at all! In future issues, we hope to use this forum to present information explaining these functions and to inform residents of certain benefits about which they may be unfamiliar.

One such benefit is the support provided to community organizations. New York State law allows municipalities

to provide funding for organizations and activities considered to be of benefit to the community including those considered to be educational, cultural or recreational in nature, as well as those that address particular issues of safety and welfare. Each year, the Town Board is presented with funding requests from several groups hoping to continue their missions, institute new endeavors or expand their outreach to the greater community. The proposals are carefully reviewed and considered, with attention to the overall community benefit, demonstrated fiscal responsibility of the organization and its resources and personnel necessary to deliver its goals and objectives. A written agreement is then executed between each individual organization and the Town of Lyme that sets forth the specific community benefit and the funded amount. The Town Board has been pleased over the years to provide this financial assistance to a number of deserving groups that enhance the quality of life in the Town of Lyme. Lyme Free Library is now open by appointment for book browsing. Contactless front porch pickup will remain available for patrons who prefer grab and go services. The visits will be limited to 2 people at a time. Arrangements can be made for families with multiple children. Parents must remain with their children at all times. Patrons are limited to one 30-minute visit per day. Face coverings must be worn by all patrons over the age of two, covering the nose and mouth. Social distancing of 6 feet needs to be maintained. Anyone who is unable to wear a mask due to a medical condition is urged to use front porch pickup. Patrons not wearing masks will not be allowed in the library. We will provide a mask if you do not have one. Gloves need to be worn we will supply them (non-latex). The Lyme Garden Club has been very busy - 29 pots and several gardens have been planted. We would like to thank Rhodes Greenhouses for the beautiful flowers. Beneficial insects can help your garden by eating the pest insects that would otherwise eat your plants. Only about a tenth of the thousands of insects in your back yard are destructive. Most are either beneficial or harmless.

The following are beneficial insects taking up residence in your gardens:


- Ladybugs are ferocious predators. They start out life as larvae, cruising around on plants and feasting on aphids. Ladybug larvae can eat up to 40 aphids an hour!
- Green lacewing larvae, which look like a mix between a slug and an alligator, prey upon soft-body garden pests, including caterpillars and aphids.
- Praying mantis are fierce predators and feast upon grasshoppers and beetles. Note, however, they will eat other beneficials, such as butterflies and bees.
- ♦ Spiders (technically arachnids) are attracted to their prey by movement and eat many live insects.
- Ground beetles is the name of a large group of predatory beetles that are beneficial as both adults and larvae. They will feast on nematodes, caterpillars, thrips, weevils, slugs and silverfish.
- Brachonid wasps lay their eggs on the backs of tomato hornworms and other caterpillars. As the eggs hatch, the larvae actually feed on the hornworm/caterpillar. Eventually the weakened hornworm/caterpillar will die.

The first and obvious reason for using beneficial insects is not having to resort to chemical pesticides. Chemical pesticides are just as deadly to the good insects and their use for long-term maintenance of your garden will not be effective in wiping out a second wave of pests. Also, a number of insects are starting to show greater resistance to chemical pesticides.

A diversity of plants will attract a wide range of insects. Many beneficial insects appear in the garden before the pests do and need an alternative food source such as pollen and nectar if they are to stick around. By providing water, food and shelter, your garden will become an inviting home for beneficial insects. (almanac.com, organiclesson.com).

Our First Independence Day Celebration

In 1802 Chaumont was the site of the first Independence Day celebration in this part of New York State. Independence Point is named for the party it hosted 219 years ago. Frank D. Rogers described the event in his 1897 book "Folk-Stories of the Northern Border":

"The first celebration of our national independence in all this region of the country was held at Chaumont in 1802. The number in attendance was certainly more than a hundred persons. From Champion and Hounsfield, Watertown, and Brownville, Sackets Harbor and Cape Vincent, and other points of settlement, the forefathers and foremothers came to do homage to the old flag and the land of the brave. Several were Revolutionary soldiers. Food and drink were plenty. Indians and squaws must also have joined the festivities. Rum and maple sugar, shooting at a mark and wrestling, stories and songs, and fife and drum, could hardly have been wanting on this occasion, although there is no published report of the proceedings to guide in making out the history of that Fourth of July."

In addition to family files and binders of local interest, we have yearbooks from Lyme Central (some of which are for sale), copies of the Thousand Islands Sun, Bilkey Moore's Lyme post card collection, and many diaries, memoirs, and autobiographies.

Lyme Food Pantry

At the Lyme Food Pantry we have certain foods we always distribute. The following recipes are examples that can be used with some of the ingredients to make easy meals for families.

Creamy Beef Bake

Prepare: 1 box of Mac and Cheese

Brown: 1 lb of ground beef, 2 tablespoons of chopped

onion, 2 tablespoons margarine

Stir in: 1 can of cream of mushroom soup $\& \frac{1}{2}$ cup milk Put in greased casserole dish, bake at 350 degrees

for 25 minutes

Scallop Corn

Combine: 1 can cream of chicken soup, I tablespoon minced onion, dash of pepper, 1 can (1 pound) whole kernel corn drained, 1 cup crumbled saltine crackers In quart casserole dish, alternate layers, dot with margarine

Bake at 400 degrees for 25 minutes. 6 servings

Boxed brownie mix for dessert: Follow directions on box


